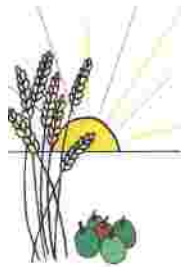

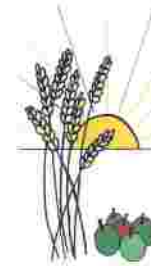

Neighbourhood Watch

We have had a recent spate of burglaries in the area. Please be more mindful of home security. People are leaving their homes more easily accessible for criminals so please ensure that your doors are locked and that windows, even upstairs windows, are closed before leaving the house.

MUSIC IN DORKING - SEPTEMBER 2009

During the past year we have enjoyed, as usual, an excellent season of music in Dorking. In both range and quality, it is something that most towns of our size (and many larger ones) simply cannot match. We are very fortunate to live in an area where music-making is so highly valued and so much enjoyed. It contributes greatly to our quality of life and we should endeavour to support those many organisations - mostly amateur and voluntary - who provide us with so much wonderful music: our many local choirs and orchestras, the Dorking Concert Society, the Leith Hill Festival, and others.

Among the concerts to look forward to in the coming season are two visits by the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra featuring several favourite pieces: Elgar's *Enigma Variations* and his cello concerto, Mendelssohn's *Hebrides overture*, and Grieg's piano concerto. The Endellion string quartet, well known from its several previous visits to Dorking, will be playing three concerts with music by Haydn, Beethoven, Mendelssohn, Brahms, Tchaikovsky and Bartok. Dorking Concert Society will sing Haydn's great oratorio *The Creation*, and the Leith Hill Festival will present more choral music including Elgar's *The Music Makers* and Vaughan Williams' *Benedicite*. Undoubtedly another season to look forward to and to enjoy!

September sees the lunchtime concerts begin at St Martin's, with David Pipe giving an organ recital (3rd), Martin Ellis giving his 126th organ recital (10th), bass-baritone John Stanton (17th), and violinist Alexander Dungate (24th). Another lunchtime concert, at Dorking Halls, is given by Cordes en bleues, playing a selection of gypsy jazz and Parisian café music; the higher price includes lunch.

Watermill Jazz meets each Thursday evening at the Friends Provident social club. Their programme in September is: the Pete Churchill trio with Bobby Wellins (3rd), the Bone Supremacy (10th), the Mike Piggott quartet (17th), and the Roger Beaujolais quartet (24th).

The Heritage Open Days weekend, which runs from 10-13 September, also includes several musical items. At Pixham school the choir will be performing, and St Michael's church at Betchworth has a concert by Sutton High School chamber choir. The Christian Science Church in Moores Road has two recitals. St Mary's church in Buckland has a demonstration of bell ringing and St Mary's church in Holmbury St Mary offers a chance to play the carillon. There will be tours behind the scenes at Dorking Halls and the Menuhin Hall at Stoke d'Abernon. Dorking Halls and the Menuhin Hall at Stoke d'Abernon will hold an open day. There will also be a walk on Leith Hill including a visit to Leith Hill Place, the childhood home of Ralph Vaughan Williams. Full details of these FREE events are in the Heritage Open Days booklet.

RECIPE of THE MONTH—Blackberry & Apple Flapjack

- 1 1/4 lb cooking apples
- 1 oz. Caster Sugar
- 1 1/4 lb. blackberries
- 1 1/2 oz. dark muscovado sugar
- 5 oz. unsalted butter, diced
- 4 tbsp. Golden Syrup
- 7 oz. Rolled Oats
- 1 1/2 oz. sunflower seeds
- 1 1/4 tsp. ground cinnamon

Serve decorated with poached apple rings or blackberries and icing sugar. Serve with Custard!

- 1 Set the oven at 375 degrees (Gas 5). Butter an 8-inch springform cake tin , line with greaseproof paper and butter the paper.
- 2 Peel core and slice the apples, then very gently simmer with the caster sugar in a covered saucepan until soft. Stir in the blackberries and leave to cool slightly.
- 3 Gently heat the muscovado sugar, butter and golden syrup until the mixture has dissolved. Stir in the oats, sunflower seeds and cinnamon. Use three-quarters to line the cake tin taking the mixture to about one-inch from the rim. Pour in the apple and blackberries and then cover with the remaining mixture dressing it down lightly. Bake for about 35 minutes.
- 4 Allow to cool for 10 minutes before removing. Decorate with poached apple rings or blackberries and icing sugar and serve with custard.

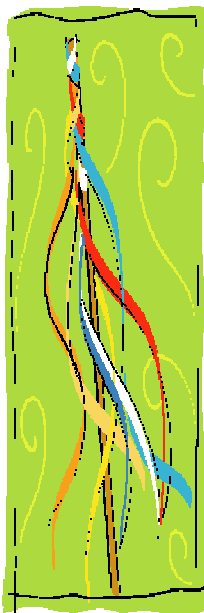
